This year, the ECAA was delighted to present the Founders Award to Fred and Marion Bleiler. Most of us know Fred simply as "Coach" and Marion as the one who took care of things, whether it was getting the athletes to a sporting event or providing a meal or a place to stay. There were

sporting events. Here are just a few more accolades from both faculty and students:

- Fred Bleiler was a complete and extremely professional educator. He knew his material thoroughly. He knew all of the proper techniques to use and could explain why and how to use them so clearly and logically that it was obvious he possessed a special gift for teaching and coaching.
- Fred has set a powerful example through his honor, integrity, and devotion to the welfare of his students. He has also been a good friend to those who are in AA by making a place avail-

- able for Sunday morning meetings.
- "Coach" was instrumental in getting the women's sports programs off the ground by coaching both volleyball and basketball until he could get other coaches the following year for the women's program.
- Fred and Marion always provided a place to stay anytime people came to town, a few good meals, and a sympathetic ear to those who sought them out.
- Fred and Marion still make a point to support the alumni association and participate every year in our reunions.
- The two also keep in touch with alumni and make a point to visit them when they make their cross-country treks in their camper each year.

In all of their endeavors, Fred and Marion have been truly dedicated to our family and continue to welcome us with open arms. Because of their ongoing support, we were delighted to present them with the 2002 Founders Award.

EC Alumni Association Marks 20th Since College's Closing

This past summer marked the 20th anniversary of the closing of Eisenhower College—and of the creation of the current alumni association. It's worth pausing for a moment to recognize that we have been successful as an association despite all of the odds against us. Like me, you probably still run into people who are surprised to hear that there is an alumni association for a dead college—and that we even hold reunions!

When the college was closed in July 1982, Kevin Smyth '78 was the president of the alumni association, which functioned with the assistance of Eisenhower College of RIT. Kevin, then living near Washington, DC, re-created an Eisenhower College Alumni Association with the intention of fighting the closing. Our link with the original association was tenuous—just Kevin himself. We needed this to be a separate entity from RIT to function freely. Those of us on Kevin's handpicked board of directors truly wondered if anybody would follow us

when we declared ourselves to be the new EC Alumni Association. Fortunately, all of you eventually did.

Twenty years later, there are still things we wish we do better. We'd like to generate higher reunion attendance—sometimes forgetting that it's a victory simply to have reunions every year. We wish we could afford to publish two newsletters every year. We'd like to do regional reunions, but it's hard to find the time.

Nevertheless, we are still here. We incorporated with tax-exempt status in 1983. We've held reunions on the campus since the mid-1980s. (Those were back in the days when we had to get permission from the U.S. Department of Education to come onto the property, couldn't enter the buildings, and had to rent port-a-potties for our on-campus picnics.) We created a good address list for EC alumni from almost nothing. We're very proud of our ECAA scholarship program, which has awarded scholarships to college-bound high school

students since about 1983. Our Founders and Legacy awards have become annual ways to express our gratitude to those who contributed to our unequalled education. Our Memorabilia Committee has had custom display cases built in our Alumni Room on campus and is working through cataloguing and preserving the remaining EC papers and artifacts. (Gigi Carnes '81 is doing a great job but could always use more help.) Our newsletter, *World Studies XI*, keeps coming out year after year.

All of this has been accomplished by three groups: a small volunteer board of directors, chaired since 1995 by Caroline Simmons '78; by our very professional staff at Stewart Howe Alumni Service, led by Lisa Wood '79; and by those of you who contribute to the ECAA. Thanks to them and you, we're still here and will be for years to come.

Led By Ike Faculty Member, Seniors Take On World Issues

A group at a Canandaigua retirement community discusses international affairs every week.

A week before Don Allen moved into one of the apartments at Ferris Hills at West Lake, he had much to do.

There were speakers to contact, meeting rooms to reserve and foreign policy decisions to discuss.

Allen, a former chemistry professor about to go to his 70th college reunion at Dartmouth, took care of every detail before he arrived at this small retirement community on a hill above Canandaigua Lake.

Now, every Wednesday, just before lunch, Allen and about 20 of his neighbors gather in a conference room at Ferris Hills to discuss international issues. Since 1960, he has organized similar meetings of the Foreign Policy

"It's been a great program, and I've enjoyed it throughout the years," Allen said yesterday.

Like a mini-United Nations, people from a variety of backgrounds meet to debate issues and fill out a survey. The results are tabulated at the end of the year and included in a report to Congress. For Allen, the meetings are part of an old routine. After living in Seneca Falls for 30 years, he moved to Canandaigua to be closer to his wife, who is a patient at Thompson Health Center's continuing care center.

One day, Allen would like to open the discussion to the community outside Ferris Hills.

Residents say they welcome a chance to learn about other areas of the world. Allen hands out articles written on the topics before each discussion, so each member is brought up to speed.

"After a few of these, you realize how much you don't know about the world," said resident Jim Bruce.

Jane Lavery also liked the lively discussions.

"This is one of the better things they're doing here," she said. "Of course, I like the

bridge lessons, too."

Yesterday's discussion centered on AIDS in Africa. Edward Shanken, a Seneca Falls Rotarian who lived in Ghana from 1993-1994, led the discussion.

Shanken learned a lot about poverty in Africa, seeing it firsthand in the grass huts the people called home and the open sewers where garbage rotted on city streets. He said before he lived there, he wasn't even sure how slaves were transported to the United States, and was surprised they were sold by their fellow Africans.

"Most of what I knew about Africa before I lived in Ghana, I learned in the old Tarzan movies," he said.

The discussion turned to his efforts to aid a small village which made him an honorary chief at its yam festival.

He learned of the AIDS epidemic and how culture and poverty have contributed to its spread.

When it came to a question of America's role in the continent's fight, Bill Pugh had more questions.

"If we can't manage our own health care system, how can we manage what's going on in Africa?" he asked.

Once Allen called for an end to the meeting, each participant jotted down responses to a survey about drug companies' roles in battling AIDS, the disease's threat to the United States, and related issues.

A few at a time, they left the room, whispers of the conversation still on their lips.

"I think it's marvelous," Lavery said.
"This is a program the whole community could benefit from."
