2005 Awards Go To Dresser, Klotz, and Nagle

he Alumni Association paid tribute this year to three people who have contributed substantially to Eisenhower College, its students, and the ECAA: Dr. Dave Dresser, Dr. Dick Klotz, and Stephen Nagle '75. Dave Dresser received the 2005 Legacy Award because his history of the college is a comprehensive view of what happened there that will last for generations. We awarded the 2005 Founders Award to

Dick Klotz, the first director of admissions, because of his role in the founding of the college and of his continuing support to the alumni association over the years. Stephen Nagle '75 was this year's recipient of the Distinguished Alumni Award for his cheerful and repeated assistance to us on insurance matters at a time of delicate negotiations with NYCC on the future of our relationship.

Caroline Simmons '78, chair of the ECAA, had this to say in her pre-

sentation to Dave Dresser:

"The board of directors created the Legacy Award in 1997 to honor those groups and individuals who have made a unique and sustained contribution to the perpetuation of the ideals and memory of Eisenhower College. The first award was to the Delevan Family, with subsequent awards to Dr. Don Allen, Howard Van Kirk, the original alumni association board, and Dr. Jim Troisi. We do not

make this award every year, reserving it for those who are particularly deserving of this honor. Tonight, we're recognizing the contributions of just such a person: **Dr. Dave Dresser**.

"Most of you know Dave from his more than 10 years at Eisenhower College as vice president for student affairs and dean of students. He came to us from Syracuse University, where he earned his PhD and was an assistant provost and a professor of higher education. (continued on page five)

What A Difference A Decade Makes: Caroline Simmons Honored

At the 2005 Homecoming banquet, the board of directors honored Caroline Simmons for her 10 years of service as chair of the board. Caroline is stepping down this year after the longest tenure of any chair—in fact, she held that position for almost half of the life of the ECAA. In just the last year alone, Caroline oversaw the celebration of the 40th anniversary of the groundbreaking, negotiated a new permanent agreement between ECAA and NYCC, and got the association's website started.

Pam Romeo Havens, herself a past chair of the board, presented Caroline with a Spode bust of President Eisenhower to commemorate her 10 years of service. Pam made the following remarks:

mere 10 years ago, the average new car cost \$20,000; today, it's more like \$30,000. The average new home was \$107,400; now it's around \$300,000. A first-class stamp cost 32 cents; today, you can expect to kick in another nickel. The average price for a gallon of gas was \$1.24; plan to pay nearly double when you pull up to the pump this weekend. What a difference a decade makes...

In 1995, Bill Clinton was mid-way through his first term as president and the Republicans controlled Congress. The country was at peace, the economy looked to be in fairly good shape, and the Boston Red Sox were still trying to win the World Series.

Ten years later, George W. Bush is into his second term as president, and the Republicans *still* control Congress. We're at war against terror—in the far reaches of the world, including Iraq and Afghanistan—and our peace feels threatened. For some, the economy still seems pretty good; for others, it seems uncertain. One thing *is* certain, however—the Red Sox drought is finally over! What a difference a decade makes...

Ten years ago, I had a babe in arms—an only child. Now she is almost as tall as I am, and her brother is catching up quickly. And 10 years ago, my hair was a lot less gray and about three shades darker! What a difference a decade makes...

A decade ago, in 1995, ECAA's membership roles contained about 970 names, our alumni directory was outdated, our memorabilia remained largely in boxes with no real means for display, and our awards program was just getting off the ground. We were uncertain as to how our future would unfold, especially in regard to the newly installed "tenants" of our former home. As an organization, one might say, we were going through "adolescence" and all the changes and challenges that go along with it.

When I stepped down as ECAA chair in the summer of 1995, I did so knowing that I was passing the reins into a most capable pair of hands. Hands that, if you'll pardon the athletic analogy, were ready to accept my pass, drive down the court, and effectively execute the slam-dunk. And that is exactly what happened. What a difference a decade makes...

Today ECAA's membership roll has swelled to almost 1,100 names, the membership directory continues to be updated, and our website is ready for launching. We know where you are, and you know how to reach us! We have experienced a significant increase in the number of five-star and sterling club contributors, allowing the association to not only survive but thrive as an independent entity. And we now have our own "merchandising line." The "Preserving the Legacy" and scholarship programs have been further strengthened through the sustained engagement and involvement of talented and caring hands. These two programs enhance our efforts to further the "global perspective" concept cultivated in all of us so many years ago.

Our memorabilia has gone from boxes to permanent display cases. No longer tucked away in rooms at the end of the Tunnel, these artifacts have found a permanent home in a highly visible area in the former Slater Library. Our ties with New York Chiropractic College have been solidified through the careful negotiation of a new "perpetual lease." The joint commitment of ECAA and NYCC to the preservation of the Eisenhower College legacy ensures that future generations can come to know and appreciate the uniqueness of our institution, our education, and our people. And speaking of legacy...

The "Legacy Award" has become a permanent cornerstone of the association's awards program. Those who played a key role in both the beginnings and the perpetuation of the Eisenhower dream have been, and continue to be, honored for their contributions to our collective heritage. And to further honor all those who made a commitment to the Eisenhower dream over the years, celebratory milestones, including silver anniversaries and, earlier, the 40th anniversary of the college's groundbreaking, have been marked by thoughtful and meaningful pomp and circumstance, befitting the auspiciousness of these occasions.

It would be presumptuous to credit all of these accomplishments to one person. The ECAA board, just like the association as a whole, has always been comprised of extremely dedicated and passionate souls. They redefine for us all the meaning of the words "volunteer service." Collectively, they have worked tirelessly, in both obvious and subtle ways, to keep us connected. Still, there is something to be said for the person who leads the charge, inspiring others along the way.

What is particularly unique about our current chair is that she has lead this association through some growing pains and challenging times—and during a period when she herself was experiencing her own growing pains and challenging times. She has helped us "shift gears" as she herself has "shifted gears." Together we have grown; together we have changed. And it has all been for the better.

It is said that no one is irreplaceable—whoever coined that phrase, obviously, never met Caroline Simmons. We know that we can never replace her—we know that we can never fill her shoes (and it has nothing to do with their size!). The debt that we, as an association, owe her, cannot adequately be translated into mere words. She has inspired us with her tenacity, her humor, her loyalty and dedication, and her quiet resolve. She has led by example, and others have followed. She has been the longest suffering—I mean longest-serving—chair in the association's history, and it is hard for all of us who have been privileged to work along side her to contemplate the next crossroads at which we find ourselves as she prepares to step down from the board.

We are proud of and celebrate her accomplishments, not only those tied to the association but also her personal milestones, including her recent graduation from seminary and the beginnings of her pastoral duties. We know that she will continue to lead by example, and that many others will continue to follow her lead and will, in turn, greatly benefit from her wit and wisdom.

As she has "captained" our cause, we are certain she will continue to cheer us from the sidelines. The best we can offer her in return is to take the legacy that she leaves us and continue that drive down the court.

he board of directors is very excited to announce that the Eisenhower College Alumni Association is now on the internet at www.eisenhowercollege.org! This website includes both a public section with scholarship info, a calendar of events, and a photo gallery, and a members-only section that you must log into to access. This private area of the site offers a discussion forum, member search, and news submission form, among other features.

Enclosed with this newsletter is a letter that includes a unique, temporary username and password for you to use to access the member section of the site. For security reasons, you should change your username and password as soon as possible to something you'll more easily remember; but in the meantime, the provided username and password will continue to work until your new name and password are updated.

We have put a lot of thought into the security features of

the site, and we want you to feel comfortable about using the member section and, more importantly, about having your personal contact information available in the member search area. Due to the database-driven nature of the member section of our website, all personal contact information on file is accessible through our online member search. If you do not want certain information to display, it must be permanently deleted from our master database. Please contact us by e-mail at ecaa@alumnirecords.org with specific information if this is necessary, and after we verify your request, the change will be processed within 72 hours.

2005 Awards Go To Dresser, Klotz, and Nagle

He recently retired from the administration at Ithaca College and currently serves as the supervisor of the Town of Ovid. Dave's greatest contribution to the legacy of Eisenhower College, however, may be the 12 years he spent in writing the college's history. His monumental work, Eisenhower College: The Life and Death of a Living Memorial, will stand as the most comprehensive record of our unique college experience long after all of us are gone.

"As if this achievement were not important enough, I would be remiss if I did not mention his continuing support to all of us in this alumni association. Dave has not only been a regular participant in our reunions and other events, but he was kind enough to turn over to the association the remaining copies of his history so that we could earn the proceeds from future sales."

Caroline presented the 2005 Founders Award to **Dick Klotz** with these words:

"It is my pleasure to introduce to you someone who has been a friend and supporter of Eisenhower College and its students in five different decades. Dick Klotz, as director of admissions from

1967 to 1972, was often the first Eisenhower person a future student met. His relationship with us continued through several jobs and retirement—just a few years ago, he donated to the alumni association the original hard hat worn by President Eisenhower during the groundbreaking in 1965.

"Dick Klotz began his career in education as a teacher and guidance counselor in Pennsylvania. Prior to coming to Eisenhower, he was an admissions officer at Bucknell University and at Penn State, where he also earned a

doctorate in education. His doctoral thesis was later published as *The Rise and Demise of the Hershey College*. Dick served as the director of admissions for Eisenhower College from 1967 to 1972. After his years at Eisenhower, Dick worked as an agent, broker, and owner of a family insurance company, as well as

the director of marketing for a property and casualty insurance company.

"Upon his retirement in 2000, Dick and Nancy Klotz moved to New Bern, North Carolina. Despite retirement, Dick still serves his country as a part-time Fed-

eral Emergency Management Agency reservist, a job that may send him to disaster areas several times a year.

"The Eisenhower College Alumni Association is pleased to present Dick Klotz with the 2005 Founders Award for his support to Eisenhower College and its students from the college's founding to the present day."

Stephen Nagle '75 was this year's Distinguished Alum, and Caroline presented him his award with these words:

"Tonight it gives me great pleasure to introduce to you this year's Distinguished Alumni of Eisenhower College: Stephen Nagle of the class of '75. Stephen is a husband, a

> father, a business owner, a volunteer in his community, and this year he gave generously of his time and expertise to help the Eisenhower College Alumni Association at a crucial time.

> "Stephen is from Elmira, New York, which he will proudly tell you is also the home town of Space Shuttle commander Eileen Collins, designer Tommy Hilfiger, and author Mark Twain. Unlike the others, however, Stephen had the advantage of graduating from Eisenhower

College in 1975. Four years later, he married Susan Gilman of Horseheads, New York, and they have three children: Kathryn, Ryan, and Kevin. Kevin, incidentally, just returned yesterday from the 2005 National Boy Scout Jamboree at Fort A.P. Hill in Virginia.

"Stephen has been the owner for 15

years of his own insurance agency, appropriately called the Stephen Nagle Agency. He has also worked as a district executive with the Boy Scouts of America and supports the Scouts as a volunteer. He is the treasurer and a parishioner of the Trinity

Episcopal Church in Elmira and supports the Glider City Workcamp, a volunteer urbanrefurbishing program for needy homeowners, as well as the Down's Syndrome Information Network in Elmira.

"Over the last year, Stephen has been extremely helpful to the Alumni Association in its efforts to negotiate a contract with the New York Chiropractic Col-

lege that defines the future relationship between our organizations. His expertise was critical in helping us deal with difficult issues like the appropriate insurance coverage for memorabilia items that are very valuable to us, are irreplaceable, and yet have little market value. Stephen was always there for us, giving or finding answers to our odd questions on very short notice. Because of his support to the Alumni Association and his generous volunteer work in his community, we are presenting Stephen Nagle '75 with the 2005 Distinguished Alumni Award."
