## Chair reflects on Eisenhower experience

As I began these musings, I was awaiting the last "holdouts" for Sunday morning brunch at the conclusion of Homecoming '08. It was another incredible weekend in Seneca Falls, connecting with old and new friends alike. As always, it left me reflective and reluctant to be physically parted from this inspiring and affirming group of people who continue to touch my life in countless, meaningful ways.

As I noted in my after-dinner remarks, "Would that I had a time turner like Hermione Granger or a TARDIS like Dr. Who that would allow me to revisit this point in time or, better yet, return to more 'carefree days' dominated by 8:00 a.m. lectures, frigid breezes across the tundra, b-ball games in the 'tin gym,' Frisbee at 1:00 a.m. on the roadways, Comm Arts and a real Peddlers' Fair, the Red Barn, and runs to the Super Duper for supplies! Alas, there is no such possibility."

Every so often, I find myself reflecting on missed opportunities. I am forever grateful that Eisenhower was not one of those, although it easily could have been. Consider that, as a prospective incoming freshman for the fall of 1974, I was advised by the college administration to place a deposit elsewhere—just in case we weren't open! Would that my courage to enroll at EC had sustained me when contemplating study abroad and enrolling in classes with those faculty members whose brilliance terrified me. I regret that I wasn't nearly "liberal" enough in defining the

particulars of my own liberal arts experience, and yet I still came away with so much gained.

Most important is the twist of fate that allowed my path to cross and then remain connected to a remarkable group of people whose accomplishments, knowledge, and broader understanding continue to awe

me. Your brilliance and understated sense of self make me restless, leave me almost aching with a longing to be more, do more, try more. And, in spite of our sometimes diverging interests and achievements, you make me feel at home—something I was certain I would be from the moment I made my first Eisenhower connection.

The chord that resonated, yet again, during Homecoming '08 was one of deepest gratitude for the unique experience we shared. From the casual conversations to the honorees' remarks, it was the essence that permeated the weekend. The legacy of our Eisenhower education remains at the heart of who we are. No matter the paths we trod after our time along Cayuga's shores, it is abundantly evident that each of us has had "defining moments" that were inextricably linked to the time we spent immersed in this unique community.

I hope that you will always celebrate that community, in your own corner of the world and through the connections afforded you by ECAA.




Austin ('84) and Sachiko Moore.

Fourteen applications were received for 2008, including one PowerPoint presentation.
