Plaque Gifted to Chiropractic College

During the weekend of our fall 2018 board meeting, the ECAA Board of Directors presented a plaque to the New York Chiropractic College. The plaque was presented to NYCC Vice President of Institutional Advancement Dr. Todd Knudsen, and it now hangs outside the inner door to the library.

This photo-etched metal mounted on a polished wooden base, is intended to serve multiple purposes. For us, it will be a permanent historical marker that describes Eisenhower College. Speaking as the designer of this, however, I will add that its main function is to inform the current and future members of the NYCC community about the history of their campus, its buildings, and the goals and successes of the college that preceded theirs. Briefly, the text covers the creation of EC by the Seneca Falls community, the ground-breaking, the college's role as a living memorial to President Eisenhower, the World Studies program, and how the original functions of many of the buildings have continued under NYCC. two purposes: depicting life at Eisenhower College and showing parts of the campus that will be immediately recognizable to people at NYCC.

Annual Meeting July 21, 2018

Steve Van Arsdale '81, chair, started by recognizing the enormous contribution of Pam (Romeo) Havens '78, our previous chair, to our success and our 35-year history. He also pointed out that 2018 marked the 50th anniversary of the opening of Eisenhower College. In the 2018 board elections, Steve Van Arsdale '81, Tina Brien '81, and Deirdre Bambrick-Oriani '79 were all reelected. Joan Purdy '72 and Deb Edgren '83 chose not to run for re-election, and we gratefully acknowledged their years of service to ECAA.

Sue Wright Passmore '82 gave a treasurer's report. Our checking account balance as of May 31st was \$3,029.56; the scholarship account balance was \$2,139.42; and our legacy account balance was \$10,030.10.

Fran Emerson '72 introduced Angela Chen, winner of our 2018 Scholarship Award. Angela's winning entry was a video essay titled "How Slavery Exists Today but In Different Forms."
