Charter Class Graduation 50th Anniversary To Be Celebrated During Homecoming 2022



Dedication of ECAA Historic Marker

On October 1, four to five dozen alumni, faculty, and friends kicked off Homecoming 2021 at a dedication ceremony for a New York State Historic Marker commemorating Eisenhower College. We met on the edge of campus, next to Route 89 and south of the main entrance. The weather was sunny and unseasonably mild. ECAA Board Chair Nancy Fromer Wilson '78 led the ceremony for the unveiling of the blue and yellow, two-sided historic marker. It features the college's seal at the top and reads:

EISENHOWER COLLEGE

In 1965, President Dwight David Eisenhower broke ground here for a new liberal arts college, dedicated as a living memorial to his "life and deeds" and designed to instill in its students a global perspective.

From 1968 to 1983, a vibrant community of students and faculty took part in the Eisenhower College "World Studies" experience, graduating nearly 1,200 alumni.

Erected by the Eisenhower College Alumni Association on October 1, 2021, and dedicated to all those in the Seneca Falls community and beyond who made this institution of higher learning possible. The Northeast College of Health Sciences (formerly NYCC, see page 7), which assisted us with this project, had hoped to be represented by their president and vice president. When an out-of-state chiropractic conference made this impossible, they sent their regrets—and champagne! The historic marker itself was cast by Catskill Castings in Bloomville, NY, and erected by Elderlee Inc. of Oaks Corners, NY.

The marker was made possible through donations from Pam Romeo Havens '78, Steve Suddaby '76, and Steve Van Arsdale '81, along with a generous donation from Ellen McCahon Plossl '76 and Phil Plossl '77 for installation of the marker. It is a handsome and tangible reminder of our college, its purpose, and the time that we spent there.

A huge thank you to everyone for your support of the 2021 ECAA Scholarship Awards. The committee was able to select four winners—Adam Bova, Alizabeth Erskine, Sarah Gill, and Molly Pullen—awarding a total of \$8,000 to these students, a \$1,500 increase over last year. The committee was able to introduce each of the students to the Eisenhower community either via Zoom or in person at several informal gatherings this past summer.

The interest in our scholarship has increased each year as indicated by the

number of applicants and the quality of the essays that have been received. We will be updating data on the scholarships and sharing this information in a future newsletter. The committee, as well as the application process, are works in progress and we will continue to share information with all of you.

Mercifully Brief Summary of Recent Board Meetings and Financial Report

Reported accurately with tongue firmly in cheek: In a desperate attempt to justify our inflated salaries, your board of directors met five times between the 2020 and 2021 annual meetings. Since many of our discussions involved already-completed activities like Homecoming, this synopsis will deal with main themes rather than a mind-numbing recitation of who-said-what-to-whom at each meeting. (You're welcome.)

Our main discussion topics were Homecoming 2021, the Eisenhower Legacy Scholarship Fund, our ongoing scholarship program, and our new EC historic marker on Route 89. Each of these is described elsewhere in this issue, but it's worth noting how difficult it was to decide whether and when to have Homecoming this year given the uncertainties and good-then-bad COVID-19 outlooks during the year.

Here are some highlights in other areas from the board meetings:

• Our virtual programs, the Artist & Lecture Series and "Friday Night at the

Deerhead," have been extremely popular. People are forming connections and friendships through these programs that would not have been possible otherwise. Our hardworking production team was invited to Homecoming as guests of ECAA.

- Former Chair Pam Havens '78 (aka "The Queen Mum") has been working hard on Facebook and transforming our website, including creating a virtual EC archive.
- Former Chair Steve Van Arsdale '81
 will be taking a well-deserved leave of
 absence from the board. Fortunately
 for all of us, he will become chair of our
 Legacy Scholarship Program.
- The 2021 ECAA Distinguished Alumni Recipients were JR Seeger '76 and Mindy Paticoff' 76.
- Michael DiPietro '83 reported that the online pop-up store was in operation for the last two weeks in March. We received

\$2,334 in orders, which gave us an estimated profit of \$710 for very little work and no prior investment of funds.

From the 2021 Annual Meeting:

- **Deirdre Bambrick-Oriani '79** and **Stephen Nagle '75** were both re-elected to three-year terms of servitude on the ECAA board of directors.
- Kathy Lesslie joined First Lady Mamie Doud Eisenhower as an honorary alumna of Eisenhower College. She (Kathy, not Mamie) was inducted for her work on our virtual programs during the pandemic. The surprise ceremony took place with Kathy begrudgingly wearing an EC graduation cap, gown, and hood. She became the newest (and only) member of the class of 2021.

Mary Flett '75: Holding Jill close. They were inseparable and brought out magic in each other. May his memory be a blessing and his art an inspiration!


Linda Tiernan Kepner '78: I never had him for a class. But I will always love him for suggesting we bring one of those "cement stools" upstairs

Remembering Ed Hosley



Upon learning of the death of Assistant Dean and Professor of Anthropology Dr. Edward Hosley, one month shy of his 90th birthday, **Nancy Fromer Wilson '78** wrote... "My heart is broken. He was my advisor, mentor, and ultimately, my friend. We had been in regular contact in recent years, and in every phone call or email, he continued to push and challenge me. We had many soul-searching talks during my years at Ike. He remembered them. He knew me.

"He continued to give me occasional assignments. When he took part in a faculty roundtable during Homecoming 2017, he worked me over the coals until we had the concept written up just right. I knew he was enjoying his neverending role as a teacher.

"He was impressed by the way our alumni association has grown and flourished, especially this year. Impressing him was always my goal, and I have been reading his emails over and over these last hours, finding comfort that he finally got to see me living up to my potential, which was never the case at Ike."

VJ Cole '76: When I did my extra semester in Fall 1976, I took a Language and Culture class solely because I wanted to be able to take a class with Dr. Hosley. This is a massive loss to the EC community.

Denise Lipman '76: I loved having him as a professor. Always the right amount of push and kindness. I will remember him with fondness.

Janet Fry '76: I'm so heartbroken. Like Nancy, I kept in touch with him and even called him in times of crisis. He always had a wise perspective and a calm demeanor, with a wonderfully wicked sense of humor... which we could sorely use these days. I would not have had the same level of character, integrity, and drive I needed to get through life without him. I cannot articulate what a positive force for good it had in my life. RIP, Doc. You were the best... and thank you so much for everything.

Harry Rosenberg '75: I have very fond memories [of Dr. Hosley] as he was my advisor also. I was a struggling student, but he was very encouraging, which helped to instill confidence in me. He saw more in me than I was able to see at that time. I will always be grateful for the time that I knew him!

Ellen Silverman '76: I never had him for a class, but he was my advisor senior year. I remember going to him crying because I did so horribly on the GREs and thought my academic career was at an end before it even started. His response was "Well, there's always the Navy." He made me laugh (and I still laugh about that comment) and then sat me down to discuss other options. I very much appreciated his advice.

Mary Flett '75: Another giant felled. Such a wonderful and inspirational teacher.

Pizi (Zurenda) Nielsen '73: I am crushed. He was my scholarly mentor and hero.

Elaine Briceland '76: I always appreciated his humor as I saw him daily in the Office of Student Affairs where I worked. His sly smile and dry sense of humor greeted me daily. **Deb Sharpe '76** and I would regularly tease him about his "Mr. Rogers' closet," consisting of his two button-down sweaters!

Kevin Rafferty '75: Dr. Hosley is the one who got me fascinated by anthropology, which led to my corruption by archaeology. He truly changed my life and gave me a career and passion. I am sorry that he's gone.

Tess (LaBrack) Marts '79: He was a dignified, gracious human. We were indeed blessed with the most remarkable faculty there.

JoAnn (Stephens) Forrest '77: When I think of my professors at Eisenhower, he is one that often comes to mind. He filled us with knowledge at an incredible speed with each lecture. I am so sad to hear of his passing. He was an amazing person and professor.

Bill Grant '75: One of the things I most admired about Dr. Hosley was how well prepared he was for each class. A great guy. During the last few Decembers, he sent me long letters that I will treasure. He never beat around the bush but spoke the truth.

John Austin '74: Professor Hosley is the reason I chose anthropology as one of my majors. To this day I laugh when I think about his deadpan lecture about the Nacirema tribe (American spelled backward). Most of the class was still taking notes 15 minutes into the lecture. Knowing his humor, I caught on a bit sooner. He was my advisor and my confidant and will never be forgotten.

Joe LoPinto '72: I had to wait until my junior year for him to show up. Had he been with us from '68, I may have become an anthropologist, he was so interesting in the way he taught. I *wanted* to go to his classes. I was *motivated* by him. So, I settled for philosophy and psychology and went into the BAR business.

Deb (Vivyan) Grundman '75: He and I stayed in touch too and visited together here in the West (I'm in northern CA, he in Oregon) over many years. Having worked as an admin aide for him in the dean's office, I chuckled at his Post-It Notes on his thermos and other spots on his desk. We were of like mind in staying organized. On a deeper level, as with many of you, he always challenged me (and my sons) to be the best we could be. He would often say how much we all meant to him and for that I am grateful. He introduced me to his younger sister when we were living near her, and she and I have become friends as well. And I loved his start of many lectures, one drawing of a piece of 'material culture' to draw us into the personality of a people. He fostered my desire to travel and learn. What a blessing he was!

Lise Blanchard Ducrey '75: Dr. Hosley was my advisor also, letting me know in my sophomore year that International Relations (IR) was off the list of choices as a major for someone like myself, with absolutely no comprehension whatsoever of even the most elementary economics. So, I ended up declaring in...Anthropology! And had my senior year full of classes with him. He was a true educator and someone I never dared disappoint.

David Audlin '78: Dr. Hosley, like so many of our teachers at Ike, was a man of uncompromising intelligence and standards. The world has changed, and I look back with great admiration and gratitude for what we were able to learn from Dr. Hosley and his colleagues.

Still recovering from my spine surgery last year, but overall, it is good! Still living in Pearland, Texas, with my border collies. Plan on completing my book on my family genealogy in 2021. Best wishes to all!"

Since graduating from Eisenhower, Catherine Jones '74 has lived in Vermont and Vail, Colorado, as a "ski bum," and eventually moved to Portsmouth, New Hampshire. She earned a Master of Arts in counseling from the University of New Hampshire and has worked as a psychotherapist and a title abstractor. She finally married in 2008 to a guy who was worth the wait. She tells us: "A couple of years ago, I stumbled upon my mother's scrapbook of her time as a member of the Women's Army Corps (WAC), serving under General Eisenhower in World War II. I decided to tell her

story and wrote a book called *Quiet Courage*. She died in 1986 at age 66. I wanted the world to know and appreciate the service of the WACs in World War II."
