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
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
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chair decided to resign or retire. Such a scenario played out at the October 2022 board meeting, when Nancy Fromer Wilson announced she would be step-

Joe's essay (found on the Eisenhower website: eisenhowercollege.org) stated that the trend in education is currently focusing on STEM or STEAM, but he points out that many employers today are looking for candidates with "soft skills":

reasoning, problem solving, and the ability to communicate. These skills are fostered in a liberal arts education. In the conclusion of his essay, he states that these two educational philosophies could and should complement, not compete.

# **Eisenhower College: The First 50th Reunion**

Into the Valley of Cayuga Lake arrived the 300. Or, to be more precise, 304. Each of us with her or his own story, and each with unique reasons for joining the charter class of Eisenhower College. Four years passed quickly as our numbers declined to 88. Graduation! Then another 50 years came and went. Another landmark: the first 50-year reunion celebrated at the academic tribute to our 34th president, Dwight David Eisenhower.

We had all studied the theories of Heraclitus the Obscure, so we knew we would not be stepping into the same river

we had waded out of 50 years earlier. Yet, how strange to see our beloved alma mater transformed into the Northeast College of Health Sciences! Truly, change is the only constant.

Yes, the same sun rose and fell in the sky each day, but it had weathered our faces and left us asking questions of one another. "Is that you,

Rick? Ah, yes, of course. Now I recognize you!" And so, we came. Most of us retired. Former purveyors of insurance, fine clothing, exports, and imports. Military and foreign service veterans, educators, and medical professionals. Even a farmer and talented carpenter.

How different a 50th reunion is from a fifth or 15th or even a 25th. No need to impress classmates (although some of those photos of grandchildren were pretty impressive). Instead, whether picnicking, cruising the canal, drinking, or dining, the conversations were casual, friendly, and from the heart.

If there was one recurring theme, it was gratitude. Not all of us used World Studies in our professional lives, yet we all seemed to recognize that we had received a world-class education. Over and over, we heard praise for those who had created the innovative curriculum and inspired our young minds. Al Ossman and Frank Annunziata

in history, George Walsh in philosophy, Sandra Saari in literature, Stu Van Orden in art, and Renee Schoen-Rene in writing. They and others changed our lives, in many cases transforming us from mere adolescents into young men and women. "Two courses with Warren Hickman were most memorable to me," shared one alum, while others fondly recalled Professors Troisi (thank you for being present at the 50th, Mr. Troisi!), Chu, Singh, Root, and Barnett. There is no way we can repay the educators of Eisenhower College, yet it was heartwarming to see that many of our

classmates "paid it forward" by educating or in other ways serving the needs of the next generation.

Gratitude was expressed as well to those responsible for creating and running the many extracurricular activities that were often central to our social life and growth. How heartwarming to see classmates joining Coach Fred Bleiler and his wife at lunch so they could relive memories of games and playing fields, as well as tell their beloved coach how much he meant to them. Other conversations recalled memories of concerts (Blue Öyster Cult came up more than once), plays, intramural activities (Raging Bulls vs. Fat City!), DJing for WIKE, work-study wrestling pots in the kitchen, serving on committees such as the library or student judiciary, publications, and, of course, the Red Barn, Ernie's, and the Deerhead.

Of course, in the spring of 1968, none of us could know what kind of educational

experiences we would encounter at an unknown college. So why did we take a chance and select Eisenhower? My story was simple. I had applied to one other college and ended up on a wait list that was never used. May 1968 found me desperate, but I was excited once I learned about the "pioneering spirit" of a new school that would accept me.

One student, who spent his earliest years in South America, was attracted to the international focus of the curriculum. I heard this theme repeated by another classmate with a French background, as

well as one who had spent time studying in Europe and wanted to learn all she could from "World Studies." Among our original 304 classmates, there were some who had flunked out of other schools and needed to get back in college or risk the possibility of being shipped off to Vietnam. Yet, even among these would-be scholars, there was the allure of starting

fresh with a brand-new school offering an innovative, world-focused curriculum.

Perhaps, in a real sense, we were all taking a risk. In 1968, with our backs to Cayuga Lake, we gazed on fields of mud dotted with a handful of newly completed buildings. We hoped our futures would be bright, our dreams fulfilled. Fifty plus four years later, we paused to memorialize the faculty and 15 members of the charter class who have transitioned to the great beyond. For the rest of us whose futures lay ahead, we can anticipate the next time we gather. In the meantime, we extend our gratitude to the many people who organized and executed the first 50th reunion of Eisenhower College, as well as to those working to keep the EC legacy alive. Thank you one and all!

# **Executive Summary of Board Meetings in 2022**

In its 40th year since being organized, the board met three times in 2022, the meeting in April being the first face-to-face meeting since September 2019. In October, officers were elected for two-year terms: Michael DiPietro '83 was elected chair, and Steve Suddaby '76 and Sue Passmore '82 were elected to continue as secretary and treasurer.

There was discussion about the need for more directors and noted that the bylaws say we can have up to 15 regular directors. Steve Suddaby volunteered to chair a nominating committee to approach people about their willingness to run for the board. outgrow storage space with Elevate with the approximately 5,000 articles about EC that Elaine Mellen '76 has compiled. Pam is looking for ways to expand it.
