Along the right edge of this page and page 2, each photo displays a different *perspective*. "Earthrise": the intriguing photo that graced the cover of the Eisenhower College catalog. When I first saw that cover, I thought, what kind of college is this? Reading the pages between the covers, I realized I was seeing something different, which had at its core a different perspective — a global perspective.

Next is the North American continent and Western Hemisphere in which the US is located. (If you know this, you are in the minority of high school students.) The vast oceans on either side made us "a world apart," shaping our nation's perspective as conceived in the Monroe Doctrine. Those same oceans kept us relatively safe during wartime, a luxury that is diminishing.

New York State and the Finger Lakes region, seen on page 2, have their own stories to tell from Indigenous peoples, the birth of a new nation, religious revivals, and women's rights, all of which have their own microcosm of experiences to shape our perspective.

# A Reunion to Remember

I've been to three or four Eisenhower College reunions over the past five decades but my 50th was a special experience. It was like getting in a time machine and whizzing back to a time and land both far away and, yet, still so close.

Arriving at Syracuse's airport just as I did 54 years ago after being accepted, I rented a car rather than endure the three-hour bus trip I took back then. On that first trip, I planned to lobby for a scholarship. I am forever grateful that **Jim Miller** saw it my way.

This time, however, I had several goals. At the top of the list was to spend time with **Professor Jim Troisi**. I also wanted to install MapQuest on his cell phone so he could get audible directions back to his new home. He recently moved some 20 miles away from the house he had built just down the road from the college all those years ago.

What I thought would be a simple task was anything but, as Jim has an iPhone and I own an Android. Apple's security features can be very frustrating and neither I nor a pair of helpful Gen-Zers could install the app. Where are the Millennials when you need them?

Another goal was to visit The Gould Hotel where I had an office when I returned to Seneca Falls in 1975 after leaving grad school in Ottawa, Canada, to take a job as a reporter for *The Geneva Times*. Stopping by to reminisce, I ran into some alums staying at the hotel. I mentioned that my office was Room 201. "That's where we're staying," they said.

Talk about serendipity: On Saturday, I retraced the walk from my dorm to the library recalling just how frigid the journey was in January, when so many were off campus doing JIST projects in

sunnier locales. As I walked, a campus security car pulled up and the driver asked me what I was doing. "Eisenhower grad, Class of '73," I said. "I'm a '73 grad myself; what's your name?" he asked. "Mike Sciulla," I replied, pronouncing it differently (like "Shula") than I did back then. As I peered in the window, I saw that his name tag read **Steve Stinson '73**. "OMG," I said. "I remember you!" and

During a break, I stepped outside and ran into '73 mates **Larry Smith** and **Mark Germond**. The first words out of Larry's mouth were, "I'm still pissed at you." "What," I asked, "after 50-some odd years, could you possibly be mad at me about?" Larry proceeded to tell me about the Student Senate Traffic Court (which I helped establish) that heard appeals from students who felt they had

been unjustly ticketed by the school's parking czar, **Cliff Velte**. According to Larry, we didn't nullify his ticket, and this had stuck in his craw all these years. I confessed that I had no memory of this injustice. Larry accepted my apology and we shook hands. All's well that ends well in this best of all possible worlds.

My *Big Chill* moment of the weekend was the annual memorial service for those grads who are no longer with us. A crowd of maybe 40 souls gathered at the Monet Bridge on a stunningly beautiful late afternoon as **Ken Chambers**

'74 read aloud the names of those who had passed since Homecoming 2022. It was especially poignant for me as my friend and dormmate, **Ed Denne '73**, had passed away just days before. Whoever got Ed's name into the memorial booklet on such short notice deserves a shout-out. I sent it to his wife, the former **Gayle Fuess**, also '73. Full disclosure, I was the best man at their wedding in 1975.

As people of a certain age reach that stage in life when experiences are more important than buying things, it's nice to know that you don't have to travel to the ends of the Earth to have a once-in-a-lifetime experience. With only ten more 50th anniversaries to go before the final Eisenhower College Class of '83 gathers, find an old grandfather clock bearing the *tempus fugit* admonition and make plans while you still can.

Steve remembered me for turning him on to Kierkegaard, a concept I still find hard to believe.

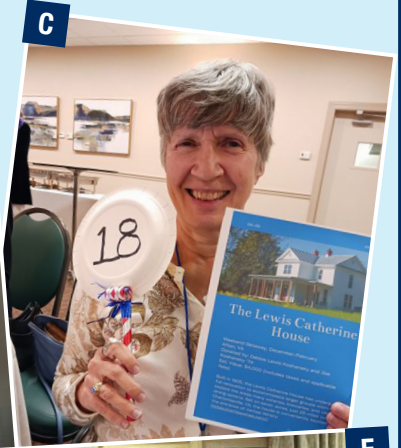

# Executive Summary of Board Meetings in 2023

Nevertheless, there are still noteworthy items to report.

## Homecoming

The one change was holding the Saturday evening dinner and Legacy Auction at the Seneca Falls Country Club because we could all be in one room with space for auction viewing. The auction

for the Legacy Scholarship Fund was a big success. The hard work of **Jeannot Barr '74** and **Susan Schwartz '77** was noted by the board.

## Website, Electronic Archives, and Facebook
