2024 Distinguished Alumni Award



Running-Grass '74, Michael DiPietro '83, and Bob Cook '74

In a move fitting our world's current environmental and cultural crises, the ECAA Board of Directors presented the 2024 Distinguished Alumni Award during Homecoming to Running-Grass, formerly known as Ron Coleman in his Eisenhower years. Running-Grass is a member of the class of 1974, which celebrated its 50th anniversary at the 2024 Homecoming. He is the Executive Director of the Three Circles Center for Multicultural Environmental Education.

As part of his nomination entry, **Bob Cook** '74 detailed the extensive and ongoing career of Running-Grass, which began — not surprisingly — when he was an EC student and a founder of the EC Outing Club. As noted by Bob, he has become "nationally recognized for his foundational contributions to the new and interrelated fields of multicultural environmental education and environmental justice. Running-Grass has been passionate about reaching

out to marginalized, low-income, and Native communities to assist them in achieving environmental justice goals." Throughout his career, Running-Grass has worked at many local, regional, and state levels, as well as at the US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) for 22 years to advance these important goals. In post-retirement, he continues the fight through his teaching and speaking events.

When accepting the award, Running-Grass told a story of two women from different cultures who initially clashed but later bonded over common ground. In his words, "Across the barrier of language, nationality, ethnicity, and other differences, these two women shared knowledge and a timeless moment together in the front yard of memory ... we need one another to remember, to unlock our diverse histories, and to discover our common and human ground."


Running-Grass went on to explain the circumstances of his life that led him to enroll at Eisenhower, saying that the college spoke deeply to him and fulfilled a childhood motivation toward international relations and intercultural understanding. He added that his Eisenhower education gave him a perspective and openness to the complex histories and world views of diverse people that ultimately led to the formation of the Three Circles Center. "It was the values and attitudes of the World Studies program and the faculty that conveyed it. ... [The] World Studies program showed me the context that helped me locate myself and relate to my world and the worlds of others."

Like the two women he mentioned at the beginning of his talk, Running-Grass concluded by thanking the Eisenhower community for "reminding me, for helping me remember where I've come from, and Eisenhower's role in getting me to where I am today in my work and life."

Tent cities and container homes are set up on every available slip of land, while the people have no ID, no income, and no way to get a job without the paperwork that was destroyed.

Hawaii manufactures nothing and imports everything except tropical fruit. Native Hawaiians are still enraged at the theft of their land. And technology is decades behind. Water bills have to be paid with cash in person. The state library is hand-stamping return dates in the backs of books. Suffice it to say that Sue has suffered culture shock. Still, she extends an offer: "I am on Maui should any Ikesters head to the islands!"
